MNOW?

- Silver Lake, Colorado holds the record for the greatest snowfall in a 24-hour period. From April 14-15, 1921, it received nearly 76" inches of snow.¹
- * "America's Ice Box" (International Falls, Minnesota) set a daily record low temperature of -37 °F (-38 °C) on January 2nd and 3rd 2010.2
- During the October 2011 snowstorm on the East Coast, an unprecedented (for October) 2.9 inches of snow was measured in New York City's Central Park on Oct. 29. Since snowfall records began in 1869, Central Park has never received an inch of snow on any given October day.³

Extreme weather conditions in 2010 resulted in a loss of approximately 50 million total man-hours of productivity in five states alone, according to a survey.⁴
